I. Course Description

Production, selection and use of photographs in the age of digital media are covered in this course. Students must have access to a digital camera. **Prerequisite:** CO226 or consent of instructor.

II. Textbook and Supplies

- (1) Recommended Textbooks: Photojournalism: The Professionals' Approach (7th Edition). Kobre;
- (2) The Street Photographer's Manual. Gibson & Stuart

III. Course Expectations & Requirements

This course will teach the basics of photojournalism in the digital media context. The emphasis will be on photographs that tell a story. Assignments will involve taking images commonly found in news. Students will be required to assemble photo web pages on *The Triton's Call*, a visual multi-media package with text, photos and graphics on Story Maps; and in a zine.

By the end of the semester, you will have developed a critical visual sense through the practical application of decisive news judgement and street photography principles. Being from Guåhan gives us a unique opportunity to showcase and tell our stories the way we want them to be told. With this in mind, this course encourages you to spend more time in your communities (families, village, subcultural groups) capturing stories that need to be told—by you.





This course includes discussions, hands-on demonstrations of Adobe Photoshop and InDesign, creating multimedia visual storytelling with Story Maps, and critiques of both published and student-produced photos. You'll also gain a basic understanding of visual communication research, with the instructor presenting relevant examples for each topic.

<u>Attendance:</u> You are allowed to miss up to 3 classes without penalty (excused or otherwise). Beyond that, you will be penalized with an additional 1% your final grade per absence. Entering class 20 minutes late will be considered an absence.
